The choices that are made now decide the spaces available in classes later. There will not be spaces held in the alternative course for you to switch into.







High School and Beyond: Apprenticeship, College, University and the World of Work



“OPEN”

An open course has one set of expectations for that subject and is appropriate for all students.

These courses are designed to broaden students' knowledge and skills in subjects that reflect their interests and prepare them for active and rewarding participation in society.

Not included as prerequisites for College/University programs.

“WORKPLACE”

These courses are designed to equip students with the knowledge and skills they need to meet the expectations of employers, if they plan to enter the workforce directly after graduation, or the requirements for admission to certain apprenticeship or other training programs.

“COLLEGE”

These courses are designed to equip students with the knowledge and skills they need to meet the entrance requirements for most college programs, or for admission to specific apprenticeship or other training programs

UNIVERSITY/COLLEGE - “MIXED”

These courses are designed to equip students with the knowledge and skills they need to meet the entrance requirements for specific programs offered at universities and colleges.

“UNIVERSITY”

These courses are designed to equip students with the knowledge and skills they need to meet the entrance requirements for degree programs, at colleges and universities.






Prerequisite Charts for English, Grades 9–12

Course Package

Each SHSM program offers students a bundle of 8 - 10 credits. These courses are regular Ontario secondary school courses that allow students to work towards their Ontario Secondary School Diploma, but have been bundled as the most relevant courses to prepare students for a future in the Hospitality and Tourism sector.

Two credits in this bundle include Cooperative Education where students pursue a work placement in a field of interest.

Achievements in the Program

- **Certifications and Awareness Training:** Students complete selected sector-recognized certifications related to the major.
- **Experiential Learning Opportunities:**
 - Have the opportunity to job-shadow industry professionals
 - Complete 2 Cooperative Education credits and get work experience in the Hospitality and Tourism sector
